## For those outside of the film and TV industry, it won't necessarily be obvious why the UK's screen industries are so successful as a magnet for international productions, and why we are so brilliant at creating shows that travel the world.

We have multi-award-winning craftspeople, generous Government tax breaks, a range of visually arresting locations and iconic facilities such as Pinewood Studios (home of *Top Gun: Maverick* and *No Time to Die*). Not to mention an amazingly creative, independent television sector developing unscripted shows like *Strictly Come Dancing, Bake Off, Blue Planet,* and *Who Do You Think You Are?* that are sold all over the world.

This growth and success, however, has also created an acute labour shortage.

Recent research has estimated that by 2025, we need to recruit approximately 20,000 additional full-time employees for jobs in film and high-end TV; and in unscripted television (which includes documentaries, factual entertainment shows and reality TV), a skills report last year showed a similar picture.

There is now a great collective effort to address this skills shortage. Many organisations are working to demystify



roles, promote job opportunities; dispel the misconception that entrants need to have a film or media degree or prior experience; break down the barriers to entry and make it easier to access careers information, advice and guidance.

The Grierson Trust is one such organisation. Our Grierson DocLab training schemes were established 10 years ago and have a track record for supporting those from under-represented backgrounds in the documentary and factual television industry. We help people without connections to get their foot in the door, then support them to progress in their unscripted careers. We now want to tell their stories in order to encourage more people to join this booming industry.

Maybe you, or someone you know, has shown a curiosity about how film/TV programmes are made, but don't know how to pursue this area of work.

We've drawn upon Grierson DocLab trainee case studies to show how they pursued their TV careers and that diversity, inclusion and equality of access matters to us, as well as the wider screen industry. We have collated a range of trusted resources for you to explore and split them into scripted and unscripted sections, to help you navigate a career path into a sector that welcomes different voices, opinions and talents.


